Susan Ball, MD, MPH, MS KNN Fellow in Leadership



Dr. Ball ($A\Omega A$, City University of New York School of Medicine, 2025, Faculty) is Clinical Professor at the City University of New York (CUNY) School of Medicine, and Professor Emeritus at Weill Cornell Medicine. She has spent more than 20 years caring for patients with HIV in New York City, spending most

of her time caring for patients in the clinical setting.

Ball graduated from Dartmouth College with a degree in Art History in 1981. She matriculated to Universite Catholique de Lille, Faculte de Medecine (Loos, France), then transferred to the Medical College of Pennsylvania where she earned her MD. After completing her Internal Medicine residency at the State University of New York Upstate Medical Center, she earned a Master of Public Health (MPH) degree at the Columbia University Mailman School of Public Health.

Dr. Ball also holds a Master of Science in Narrative Medicine from Columbia University, which she completed in 2011. Her capstone project for the degree was the completion of a memoir entitled "Voices in the Band," which chronicles the arc of HIV/AIDS in the

1990s, as experienced by her patients, her colleagues, and herself, documenting a decade wherein an AIDS diagnosis transformed from being a death sentence to being a chronic, controllable illness.

She is a member of the Gold Humanism Honor Society, and a graduate of the Harvard Macy Institute Program for Educators in Health Professions where her project focused on humanism in medicine. She has received the Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine award from the Arnold P. Gold Foundation, and the inaugural Parker Small Humanitarian award at Dartmouth College.

Dr. Ball's experiential leadership project, "Enhancing the Humanities and Humanism curriculum at the CUNY School of Medicine," will focus on developing accessible, adaptable methods for medical students to gain exposure, awareness, and understanding of the ways humanism and the humanities inform and enhance the practice of medicine. Her mentors for the program and project will be Rita Charon, MD, PhD, Bernard Schoenberg Professor of Social Medicine and Professor of Medicine Chair, Medical Humanities and Ethics Executive Director, Columbia Narrative Medicine, Columbia School of Professional Studies; Lisa Staiano-Coico, PhD (AΩA, City University of New York School of Medicine, 2024, Faculty), microbiologist, and the former president, City College of the City University of New York; Elizabeth Wilson-Anstey, EdD (AΩA, City University of New York School of Medicine, 2024, Faculty), assistant dean for diversity, equity and inclusion, City College of New York; and Jeff Fritz, PhD, MS, MATL, MACE, associate director for learning and partnership development, Kern National Network for Flourishing in Medicine.

Nicole Christian, MD, MSCS, FACS



Dr. Christian (AΩA, University of Colorado School of Medicine, 2011) is Associate Professor, Surgery-Surgical Oncology, the University of Colorado School of Medicine, and Breast Surgical Oncology, University of Colorado Diane O'Connor Thompson Breast Center.

She received an under-

graduate degree in History of Science from Harvard University in 2007, and her medical degree from the

University of Colorado School of Medicine in 2011. She completed a fellowship in breast surgical oncology at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York.

At the University of Colorado, Dr. Christian designed a family/medical leave policy for the General Surgery program, which evolved into leading the development of a University of Colorado GME Toolkit for creating tailored, evidence-based family/medical leave programs compliant with national, state, and board-specific regulations for all ACGME and non-ACGME programs. She has served as an invited panelist at the Association of Program Directors in Surgery panel, and as a speaker for the Association of Women Surgeons Career and Leadership Professional Education Lecture (SCAPELS) series.

Dr. Christian's experiential leadership project, "Integration of a CLER Subcommittee Revision to Improve Performance and Address Institutional Accreditation Requirements," will focus on the intersection between the learner (GME), the clinical learning environment (CLE/hospital), and patient care for the six ACGME core areas: Patient Safety, Health Care Quality, Teaming, Supervision, Well-Being, and Professionalism. Dr. Liappis (AΩA, George Washington University School of medicine and Health Sciences, 1999), is professor, medicine, and microbiology, immunology, and tropical medicine, George Washington University School of Medicine, and attending physician, infectious diseases, Veterans Affairs Medical Center, Washington,

DC, and co-Councilor, George Washington University Chapter of Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Medical Society.

She serves as the Medical Director for the Washington, DC, Veterans Affairs Medical Center Antimicrobial Stewardship Program. As Lead Clinician for the Capitol Healthcare Veterans Integrated Service Network Antimicrobial Stewardship Clinical Collaborative, she directs the Antimicrobial Stewardship Elective for Internal Medicine residents and is the co-Chair of the Antimicrobial Stewardship and Patient Safety Committees at the DC VAMC.

Dr. Liappis received her undergraduate degree from George Mason University, and her medical degree from George Washington University School of Medicine. She is a Fellow of the Infectious Diseases Society of America.

Dr. Caba Molina (AΩA, Loma Linda University School of Medicine, 2023, Faculty) is Division Chief of Surgical Oncology, Riverside University Health System, and Associate Program Director, Complex General Surgical Oncology Fellowship, Loma Linda University. As chair of the Cancer Committee, he

has been integral to driving institutional change, leading accreditation efforts with the American College of Surgeons Committee on Cancer (ACS-CoC), and ensuring that the hospital meets the highest standards in cancer care delivery.

He received his medical degree from Universidad Anáhuac School of Medicine in Mexico, and completed his residency training at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, and subsequently completed fellowship training in surgical oncology at University of Chicago Hospitals.
